Guidelines for Application (for PhD candidates enrolled in Canadian universities)

The CCA, within the framework of the CCA's Doctoral Students Program, offers research grants for summer residencies to support PhD students enrolled in Canadian Universities in pursuing archival research based on our Collection.

Applications to the CCA Doctoral Students Program for PhD candidates enrolled in Canadian universities must be submitted through the designated online application form. Submissions should be made in either English or French. The online application should be complete at the time of submission and include all of the following:

- **Online Application Form**
- **Abstract of PhD project** (500 words), including the name(s) of the supervisor(s)
- **Research Proposal** (500 words), identifying the items in the CCA Collection of interest
- **Curriculum Vitae**, detailing education, professional experience, publications, awards, and working languages, as well as any other relevant information
- **Letter of Support by PhD advisor**, commenting on the applicant's status as doctoral student and his/her gain from archival research at the CCA for the dissertation project

The complete application should be sent through the CCA online application portal no later than **Thursday 28 February 2019 at 5 pm** (Eastern Standard Time). Documents faxed, mailed, or sent electronically will not be accepted. Only documents submitted through the CCA online application portal will be accepted.

Notification date: beginning of April 2019.

Eligibility and Terms of Residency

All PhD students currently enrolled in a doctoral program in history and theory of architecture, planning, humanities, communications, and social sciences in Canada are eligible, regardless of citizenship. A PhD program grant provides a monthly stipend of \$2,000 CAD to cover the travel, housing, and living expenses of each recipient for a residency in Montréal. The grant is non-renewable.

Residencies at the CCA—ranging from two to three months—must take place from mid of June to end of August 2019. Attendance at a one-week seminar—a topical “Toolkit for Today” takes place in the first half of July and provides scholars with new concepts, tools, and methods for their own research—is required.

Candidates will be selected according to a set of criteria, including the originality and relevance of the proposed research, and how it relates to both the overall PhD project and to the CCA's main lines of investigation.
