



## 2022 Doctoral Research Residency Program

### Application guidelines for PhD candidates enrolled in Canadian universities

Applications to the CCA Doctoral Research Residency Program for PhD candidates enrolled in Canadian universities must be submitted through the [designated online application portal](#). Submissions should be made in either English or French. The online application should be complete at the time of submission and include all of the following:

- **Abstract of PhD project** (500 words), including the name(s) of the supervisor(s)
- **Research Proposal** (500 words), identifying the items in the CCA Collection of interest, as well as contributions to the CCA's lines of investigation
- **Curriculum Vitae**, detailing education, professional experience, publications, awards, and working languages, as well as any other relevant information
- **Letter of Support by PhD advisor**, commenting on the applicant's status as doctoral student and his/her gain from archival research at the CCA for the dissertation project. This letter should be sent by the PhD advisor via email directly to [studium@cca.qc.ca](mailto:studium@cca.qc.ca)

The complete application should be submitted through the CCA [online application portal](#) no later than **21 March 2022, at 11:59 pm** (EDT). Documents faxed, mailed, or sent electronically, other than the Letter of Support by PhD advisor, will not be accepted.

Notification date: early April 2022

### Eligibility and Terms of Residency

All PhD students currently enrolled in a doctoral program in history and theory of architecture, urban planning, humanities, communications, science and technology, environmental studies, and Indigenous studies, in Canada, are eligible regardless of citizenship. The CCA provides a monthly stipend of CAN \$2,000 to cover living expenses of each recipient for a residency in Montréal. The stipend is non-renewable, and applicants are encouraged to seek travel funding from their home institution

Residencies at the CCA—ranging from four to six weeks, with the length determined by each home institution —must take place between June and August 2022. Attendance at a one-week seminar—a topical “Toolkit for Today” that takes place in the summer and provides emerging scholars with new concepts, tools, and methods for their own research—is required (exact dates to be confirmed).

Candidates will be selected according to a set of criteria, including the originality and relevance of the proposed research, and how it relates to both the overall PhD project and to the CCA's main lines of investigation.
