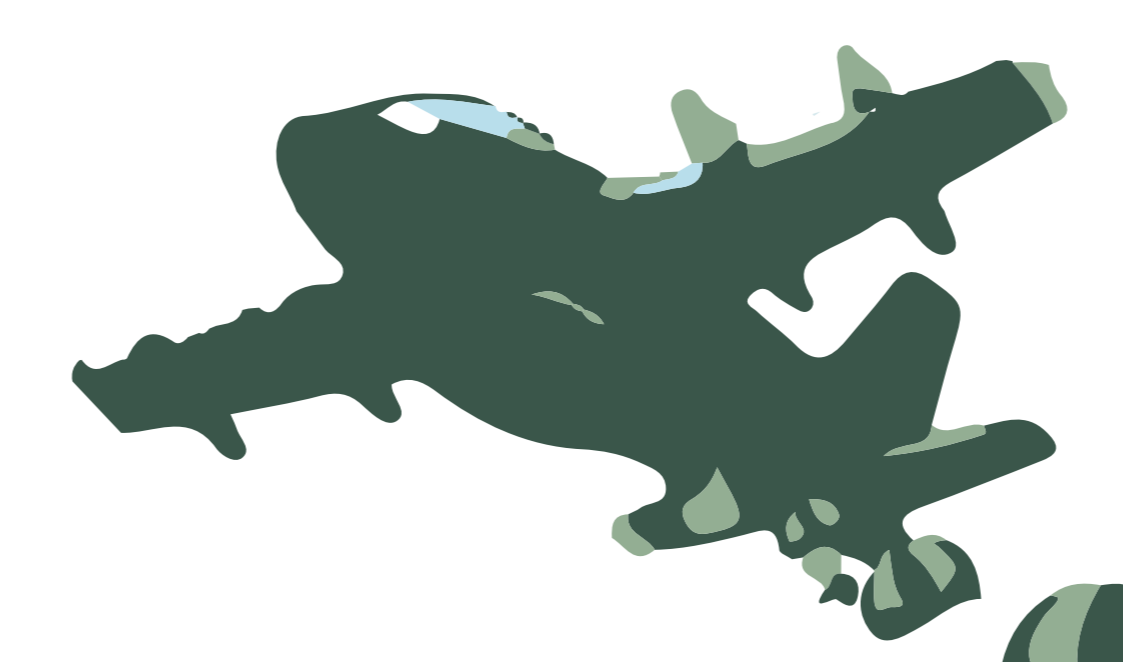


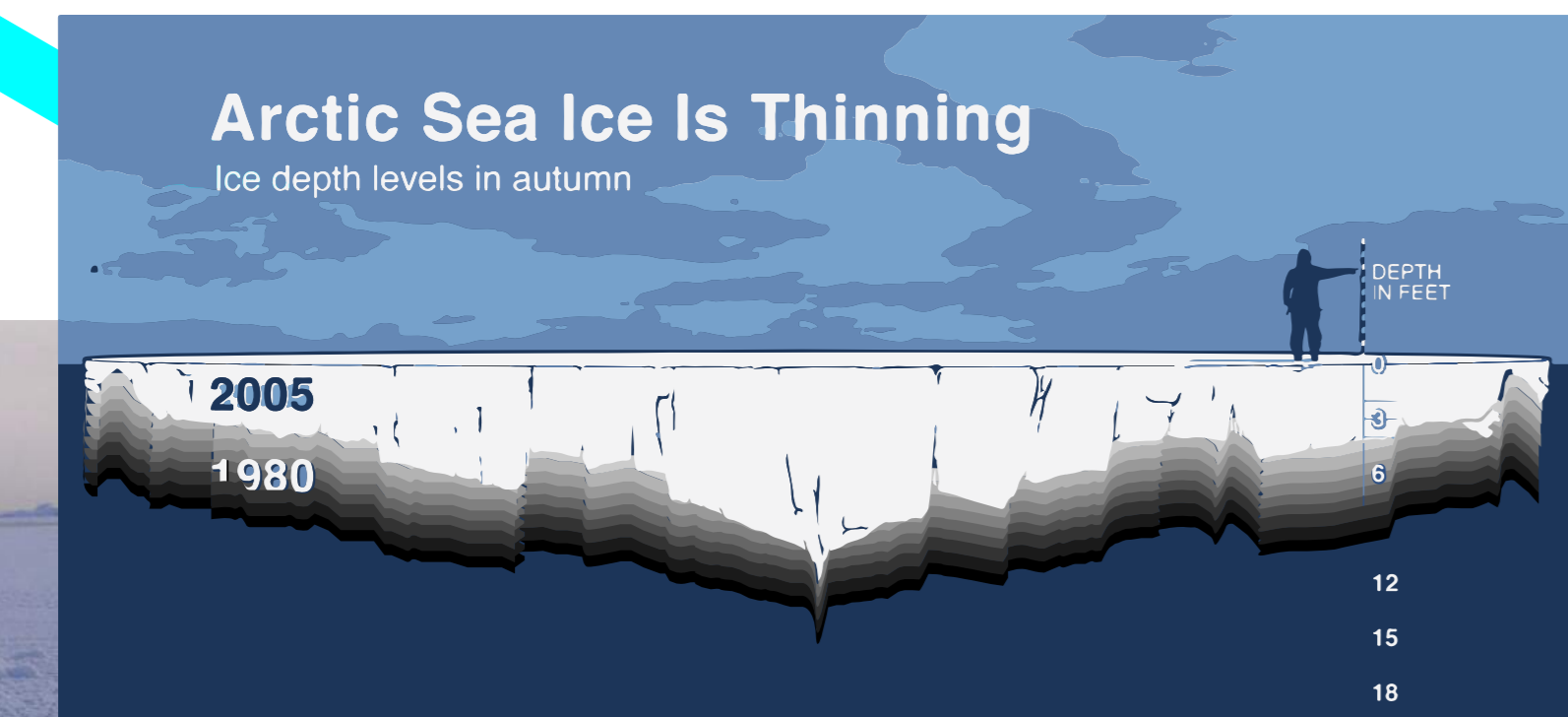
Legitimizing Issues in Nunavik



Government subsidies in the form of alcoholism and sugar and sodium filled carbohydrates and transfat foods.

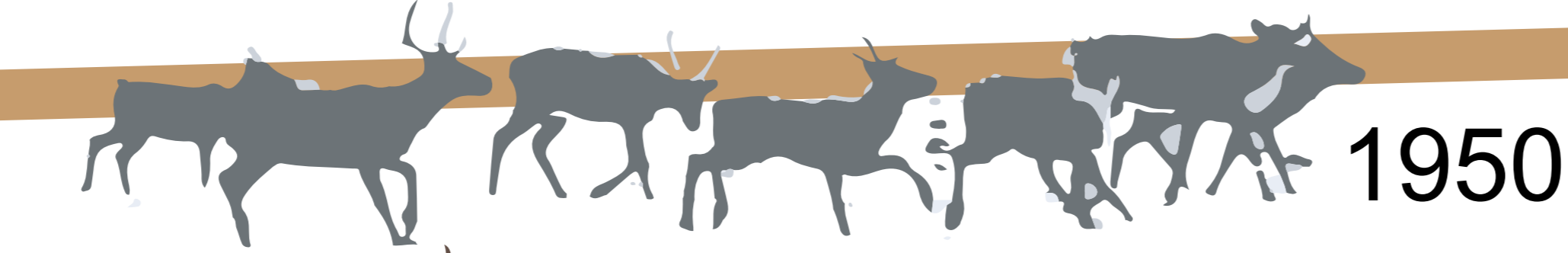


Human necessities come at a costly price.

These three bedroom homes are housing 3.9 people per room on average.

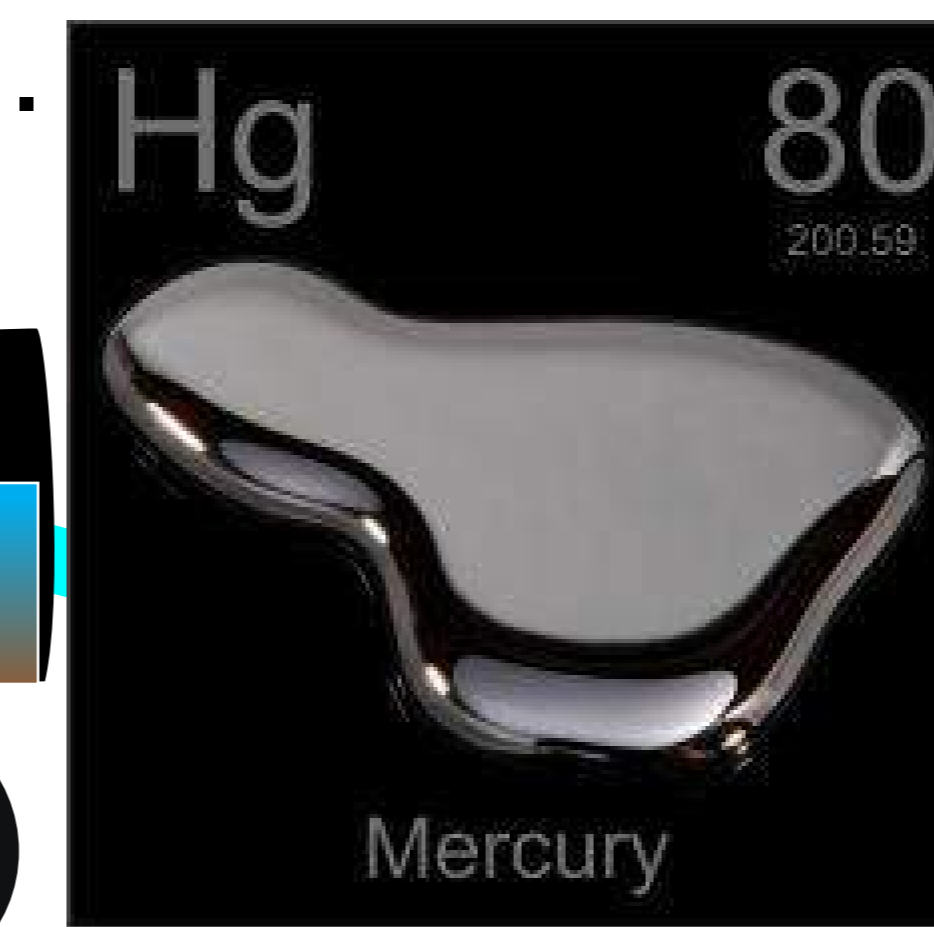
48% of homes are apart of social housing where inuit people are paying monthly fees.

Elders are unable to observe changing weather conditions

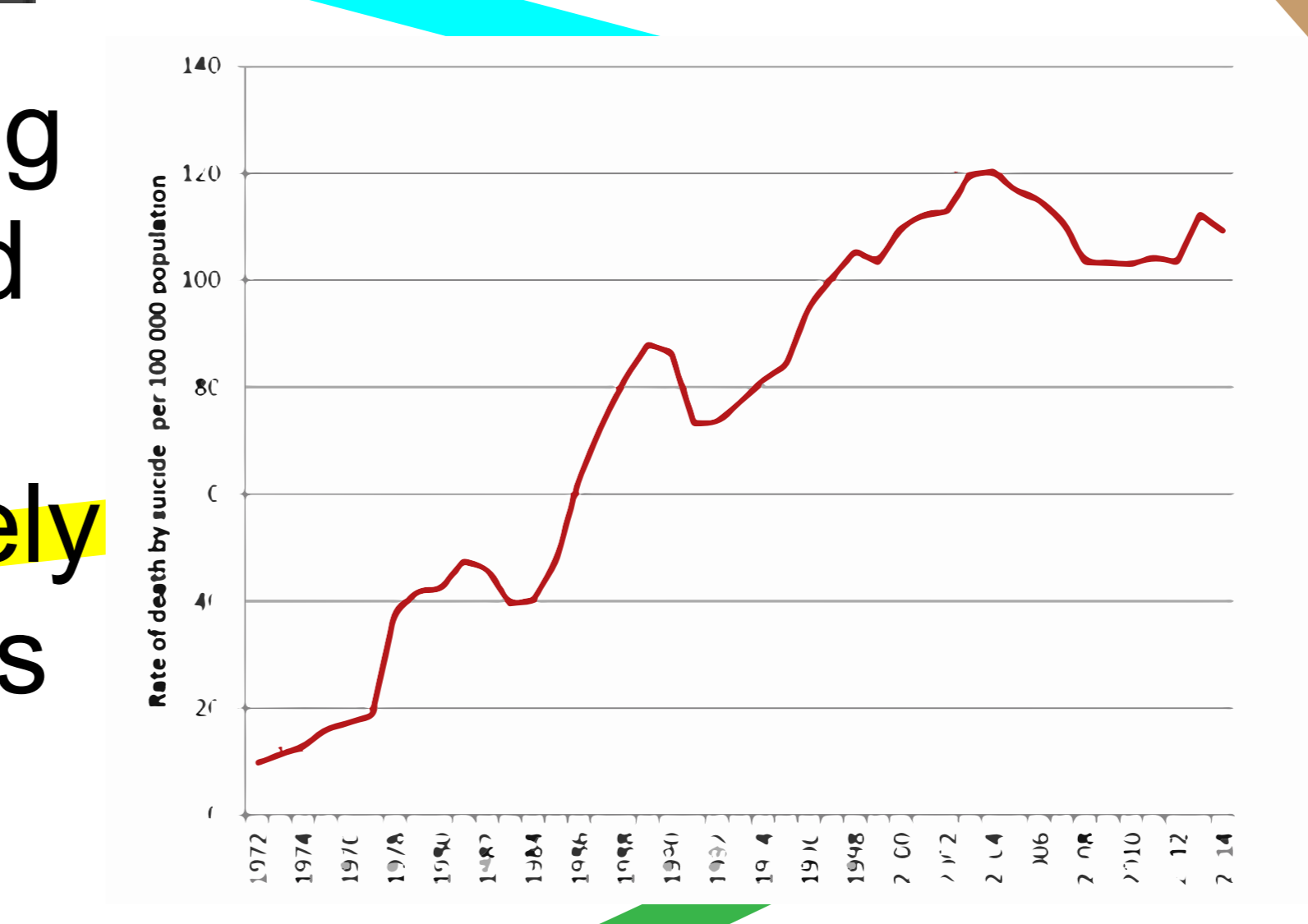


Mercury is leaching into the water and affecting the ecosystem ultimately ending up in Inuit's food supply.

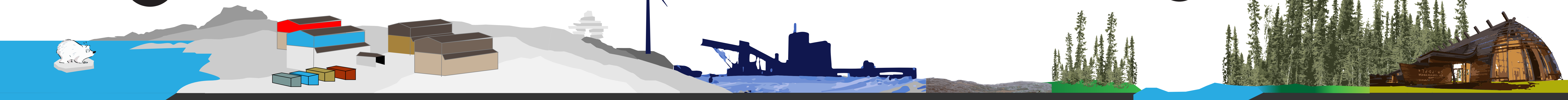
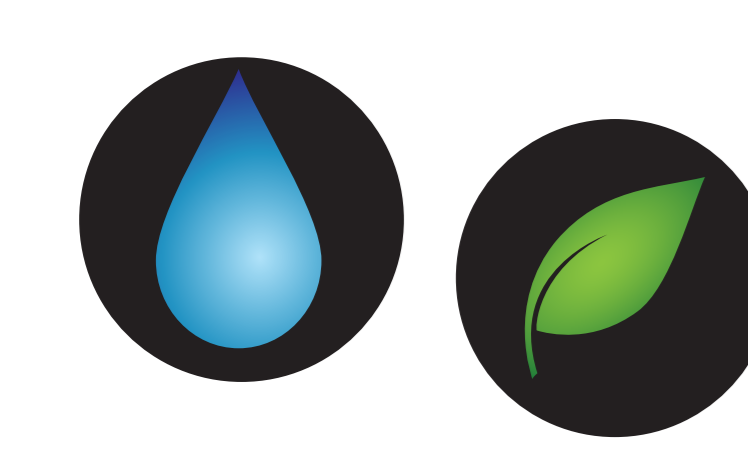
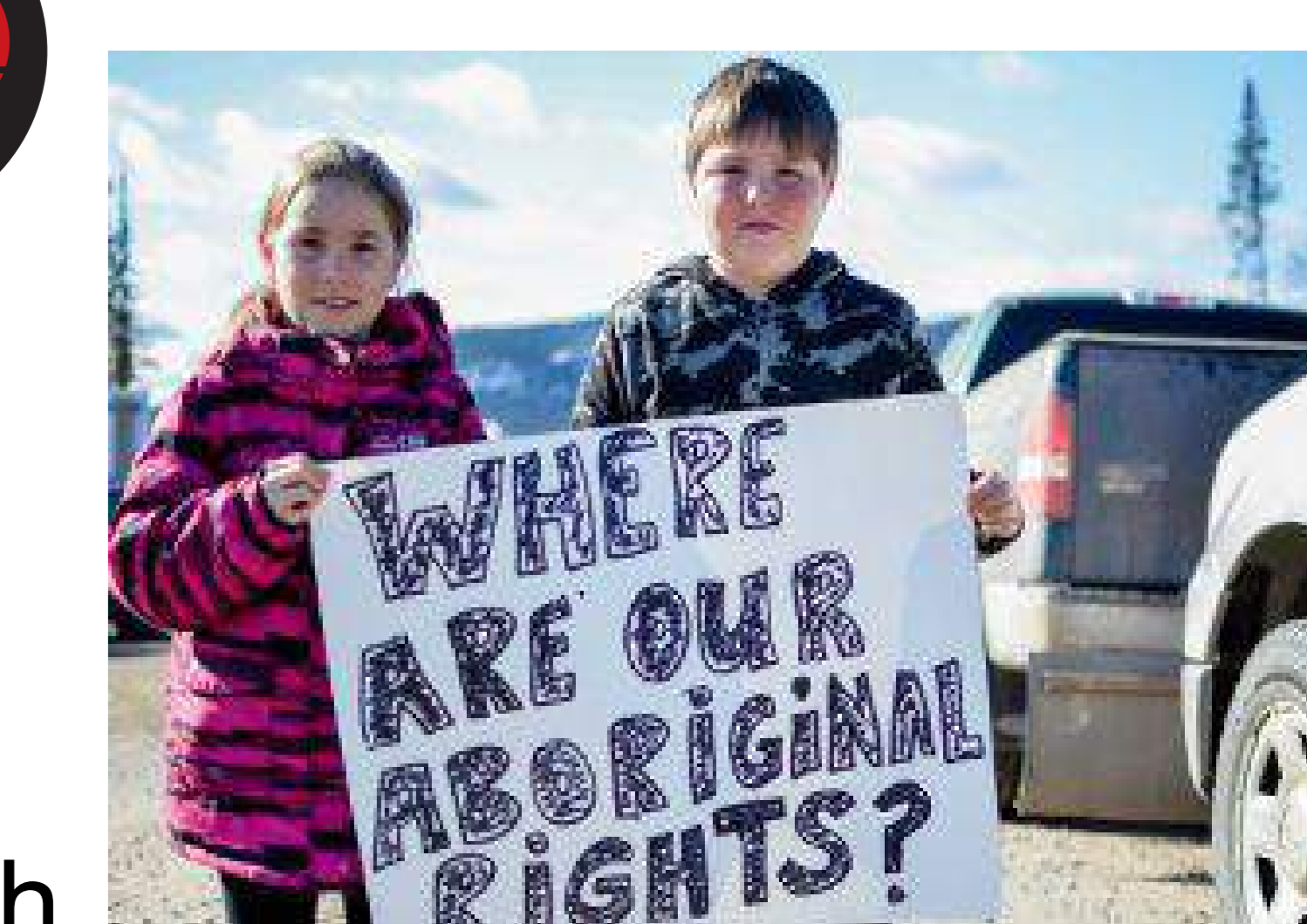
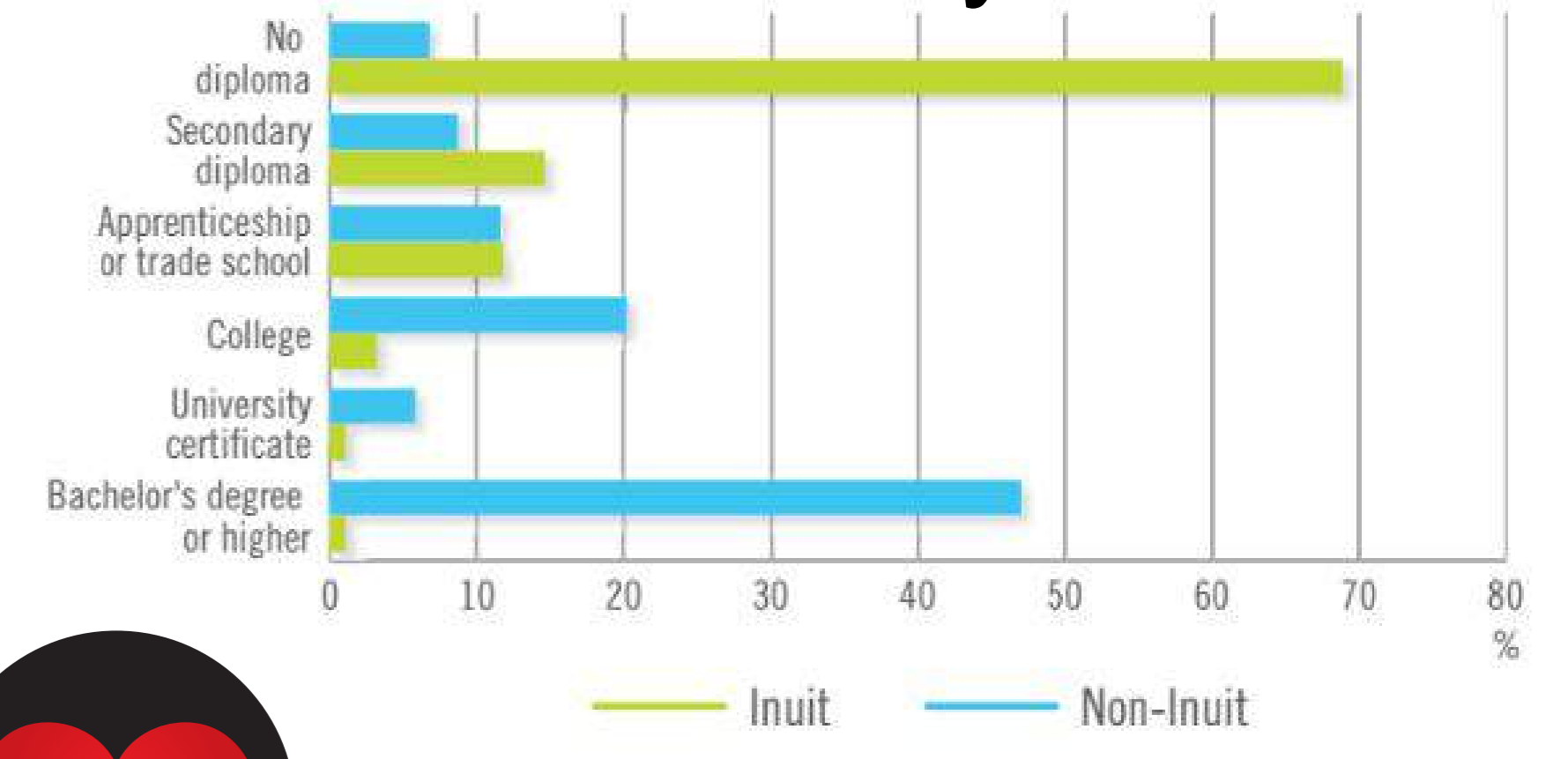


Mining companies use renewable power while communities continue to use diesel generators.

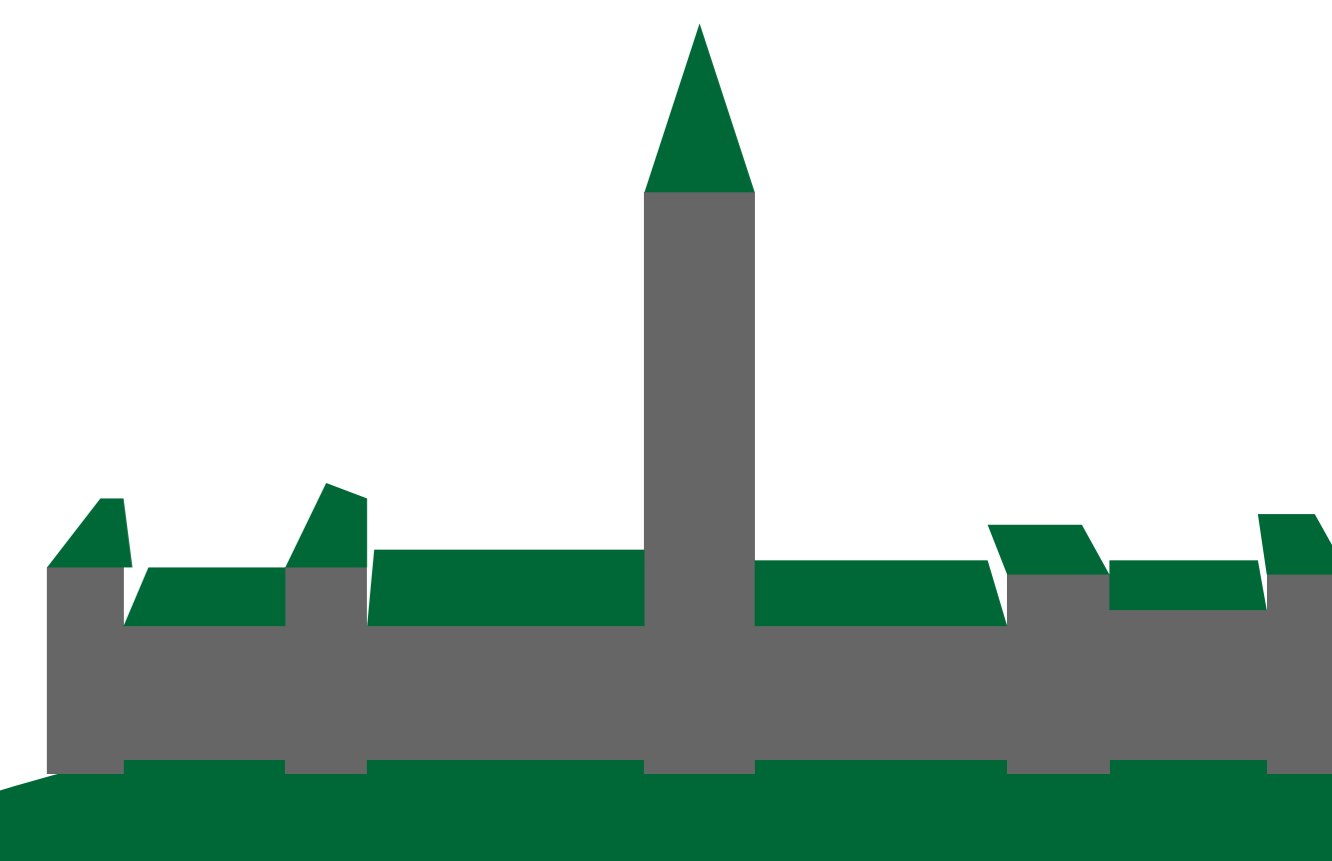
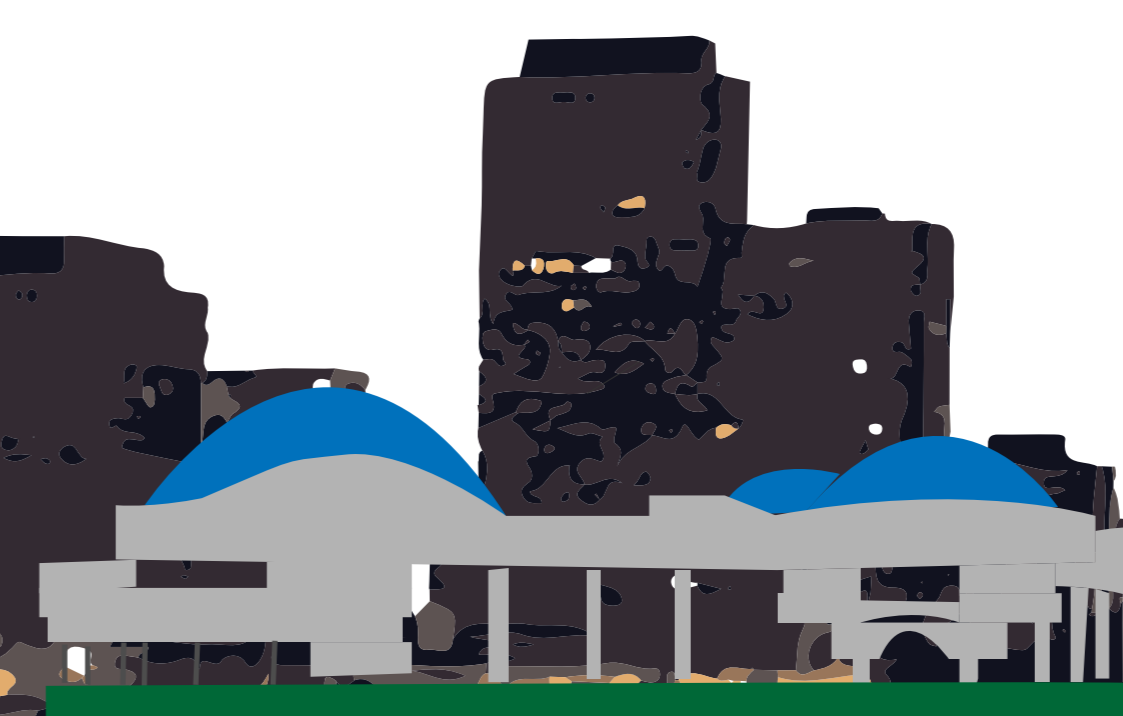
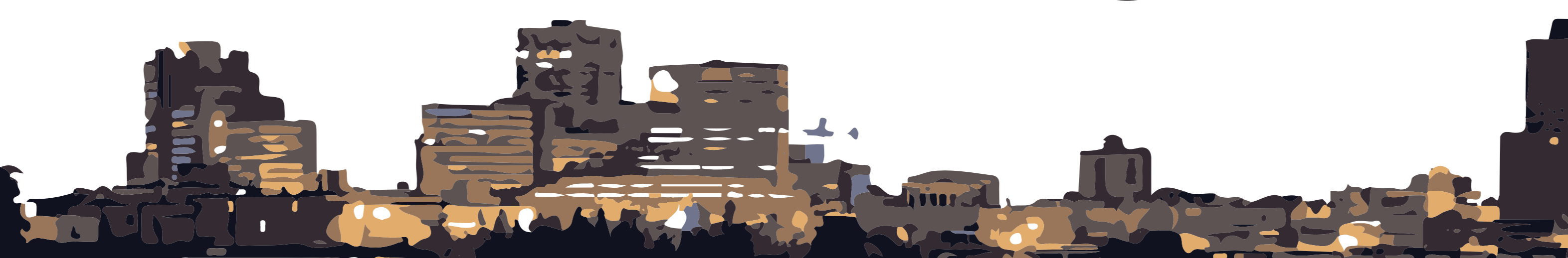
