Parasite nocturne: Winners of the CCA Interuniversity Charrette 2020 competition announced

Montréal 20 November 2020 — The winners of the CCA's Interuniversity Charette 2020 are being announced today during the special award ceremony held online. For the 25th edition of the annual competition, titled *25h city,* students were challenged to propose a design that stimulates new interactions between night and day in the city, infills our urban realm during nighttime with innovative strategies toward a more just and inclusive city, and accepts and mediates encounters of differences. The 25th hour references the new possibilities that arise when day and night are considered equal, as continuous instead of opposed.

With *Parasite nocturne*, the winning team, composed by Sema Camkiran, Laurence Chrispin-Jetté, Rafaelle Avellino, and Frédérique Desjardins, from UQAM – Design de l'environnement, proposed a nocturnal parasitic relationship between the underground interior of the Montreal metro and outdoor modular installations.

The accomplished jury, including Luc Gwiazdzinski – Laboratoire LRA (Toulouse), Laurens Bekemans - BC Architects & Studies (Brussels), and Kim Courrèges – Plan Común (Paris) evaluated proposals submitted by twenty-five teams composed of undergraduate and graduate students, as well as recent graduates.

The jury highlighted the feasible, poetic, and economic approach to the challenge by the winning project *Parasite nocturne*; the social dimension, reimagining the function of public transportation in a simple and valuable way of the project *Boîte de nuit*, awarded with the 2nd prize; and the response to the theme through lighting as a structure facilitating inclusion, by the project titled *We would walk alone at night* awarded with the 3rd prize. The jury further chose to create a special mention award for the project *Claiming liminal spaces*, that stood out by its poetic nature and the strength of its aesthetic.
